*This is a wonderful introduction to the study of Torah in three volumes. Rabbi Fields summarizes each portion and distills commentary from many sources to give a broad overview of traditional Jewish thought.*
2. The Five Books of Moses

*Alter teaches Hebrew and comparative literature at Berkeley. This book delves into literary and biblical scholarship yet is accessible to the general reader. It points to the ways a single Hebrew word can make all the difference in our understanding of the text, but it never loses the forest for the trees. In his introduction, Alter makes a case for the coherence of the Torah as a whole, while acknowledging it is "manifestly a composite construction" that was written and edited by many people over several centuries. Alter created an eminently readable translation and fascinating footnotes on various Hebrew terms. This may well be the best one-volume introduction to the Torah ever published in English.
