Dear friends,

In just a few weeks the Union for Reform Judaism will be hosting their Biennial conference in Chicago. For those of you unfamiliar with the Biennial, it's one of the largest gatherings of Reform Jews for learning, praying, socializing, inspiration, and so much more. Imagine 5,000 Jews coming together for Shabbat dinner or to make a public statement about justice. It's an incredibly powerful experience, and I'll freely admit it, I'm pretty excited. This being my 4th or 5th Biennial, I know a bit of what to expect. I know what kind of learning will be presented (both practical and academic). I know what kind of worship will be offered (classical Reform style, camp style, meditative style, one

with a 50+ person choir, one with a band). I know what organizations will be present (publishing houses, trip providers, Judaica shops, educational organizations). I even have a pretty good sense of who I'll see there (friends, teachers, old camp bunkmates, my own campers and students, colleagues and congregants from previous jobs).



I've also learned during my Biennial experiences how to tell a first timer from a veteran – the vocabulary. Now, I grew up in the Reform movement. I was active in my synagogue and temple youth group, I went to Jewish sleepaway camp, I took

As shared from the bima: My name is Barbara Miller and I have the honor to serve as the President of Temple Jeremiah. This is the third and last time I will open my remarks to you in this way. As I enter my third and final year, I want to take a moment to thank you for saying yes and for saying Hello. I doubt I will see this many of you in the same place at the same time during the next year. So, I am going to take a moment to say thank you for allowing me to be your

president. It remains a very rewarding experience and I am eager to continue the work the board has started throughout my third year. Now back to my remarks.

Two years ago, I asked you to Say Yes. And you did say yes. There are more than 400 of you that volunteer every year to run our Social Justice programs, and answer the phones in the office, and provide board leadership, and keep our building in tip top condition, and sing in the adult choir led with care by our gifted cantor, and the list goes on and on. Thank you to all of you who said yes and let me thank you in advance for every future yes. Because you keep saying yes, our temple can offer a wide range of programing while supporting our clergy and staff in their efforts.

Last year I asked you to Say Hello. Again, you answered the call. Not only did you say hello at services, you said hello when you dropped your children off for Religious School, and when you attended Adult Learning programs, and when you encountered our greeters from Misericordia and the Center for Enriched Living, and when you came to the 60th Anniversary Amazing Race event, and the Kugel Kook-Off, and at Tot Shabbats, and baseball with Brotherhood, and wine tasting with Sisterhood. This list also goes on and on.

As you know, we launched our new brand, creating our beautiful logo and tagline: The Joy of Belonging. Soon you will see a new website which better reflects our brand. And now the temple leadership has completed the process of branding with a new Vision and Mission. Why a new Vision and Mission? Because we listened to what you said to us in conversations, emails, and our congregational survey.

Our Vision and Mission now reflect who we are and will guide the work of your leadership for years to come.

Our Proposed Vision is: To be a community of meaningful

connection. The question this year is how do we do this? Last year I asked you to Say Hello, to start the dialogue, to start the relationship. But we need to take it one step further. This year I ask you to give support.

Now I know many of you are thinking, the president of the temple is standing before us on the High Holy Days talking about support. And you are thinking "Uh Oh I know what's coming." The temple is always happy to accept financial support from the congregation. And I am fairly certain our clergy, Executive Director, and new Director of Philanthropy would agree that a donation is ALWAYS welcome. Let me take a moment to thank all of you who have generously given financial support to the temple and to all of you who will continue to financially support the temple. Thank You.

But financial giving is not the type of support I am asking for today.

What kind of support am I asking for? Let me explain. The word support is complex. It has many meanings.

One definition of support is "to bear all or part of the weight; to hold up." The walls of this building have provided support and kept the roof from collapsing for the last 47 years.

Today, marks the 60th time Temple Jeremiah has come together as one community to pray on Rosh HaShanah. And 47 of those years have been in this very building. This building provided a loving home for our young congregation with 200 families led by Rabbi Tarshish of blessed memory. It has been here as our community grew to 700 families under the leadership of our Emeritus Rabbi, Rabbi Schriebman. And it continues to be the spiritual home for over 900 families led for the last 20 years by our beloved Senior Rabbi, Rabbi Cohen. 937 Happ Road has provided a safe space for literally thousands of children to be schooled in Judaism, to become B'nai Mitzvah and confirmed, for hundreds of young couples to wed, and babies to be named, and countless anniversaries and birthdays to be celebrated. We have worshiped more than 5,000 times in this building. We made tens of thousands of lunches and listened to dozens and dozens of speakers discuss the issues of the day.

The walls and foundation of this building are one example of support. But the word support can be defined as the act of supporting or to be support. This is the type of support I am asking of all of us today. The support that is needed to live our Vision: To be a community of meaningful connection.

Here's how we start to make every congregant feel connected.

You feel connected when you feel a strong sense of community. We have a 900 plus family community.

You feel connected when you experience your Jewish heritage. Torah study, meaningful worship, and holiday celebrations connect me to my Jewish faith.

You feel connected when you take the opportunity to give back. I remember one of the first conversations I had with Rabbi Cohen. He said "I want to make this building a depository of giving back. Every time you come to temple you have the opportunity to give back." That led to the collection boxes we have in our lobby today. Every time you walk into temple and bring a donation, you are making a connection.

You feel connected when you can interact with a wide variety of people from different communities. Our temple draws congregants from 35 different communities. All are welcome here. We embrace the LGBTQ community, interfaith families, people of differing political persuasions, and individuals of all abilities. We truly have a big tent.

And you feel connected when you have opportunities for personal growth and enrichment. Every week there are multiple educational programs and study opportunities.

When you start to feel all or some of these sensations, we will have reached our goal, our vision: A community of meaningful connection.

The opportunities for meaningful connection are here. Just reach out and take the next step to feeling connected. It all starts with you.

I am asking you to support the temple.

How will you support the temple- by feeling connected. How will you feel connected- by participating. As my favorite philosopher says: "Just do it."

This year, your leadership has made a change in approach. At our summer board retreat we re-evaluated the place for programming at temple. Programs continue to be important but more meaningful programs are what we are striving for.

Look for new opportunities to connect through our Jeremiah Parent Network, browse the catalogue of new targeted adult learning and music opportunities, and participate in our new Small Group Engagement initiative.

Last year I asked you to start the relationship by saying Hello. This year I ask you to support the temple- participate in a program, volunteer in the religious school, come to a shabbat service, come to the 60th anniversary celebration in November, say hello and start a conversation. That's the kind of support I am asking for. Support our community by participating, by becoming connected.

Two years ago, my vision for the temple was to say yes. Last year my vision was for everyone to say hello. This year, our 60th year, take the next step and support our community by participating. Just like last year and the year before, you never know where support will lead you.

In this year of 5780, Stephen, Erin, Sam and I wish you another year of good health, another year of peace and a year filled with the joy of feeling connected.

leadership courses in High School through the URJ and went to Israel with the URJ. I was very involved in my Jewish community. And, I distinctly remember going to my first Biennial as a teenager and having no idea what they were talking about. All of a sudden, I was in an environment with buzzwords, codewords, and keywords. There were people talking passionately about the state of our Jewish experience, using phrases I'd never heard before, but they all knew exactly what it meant. In that moment, I suddenly felt like an outsider to a community that I was very much engaged in. All because I didn't "speak the language."

It's amazing how quickly a person realizes that they're not "on the inside" of a community. The vocabulary might be different, the casual rituals might be unfamiliar, the dress code might not match what they have on, the assumptions we all inevitably make might be off. It is incredibly easy to make some feel out of place, especially unintentionally.

What do we need to do to make someone feel not just welcomed, but engaged? We need to remember what it was like when we, ourselves, first walked into a now familiar place. We need to be transparent about our decisions and practices. We need to ask a lot of questions and spend twice as much time listening to the answers. In short, we need to become ambassadors.

Great ambassadors spend their time as an interpreter between people and experiences. They help the unfamiliar get comfortable in new situations and the experienced break those situations down to find new inspiration in now unconscious practices. Great ambassadors are translators, teaching us all the true meaning to our words. Great ambassadors help newcomers get engaged faster and more deeply, without the feelings of being uninformed or naive.

At some point we've all encountered an ambassador like this. Perhaps someone invited you to sit at their table and introduced you to everyone else and how they knew each other. Maybe someone explained what to expect before you even stepped foot into a new encounter. Perhaps someone took you on a tour of all their favorite people and places when you first arrived. Or maybe they noticed how they were speaking in code and translated themselves without even being asked. So many of our communities, big and small, near and far, Jewish and otherwise, have had someone act as an ambassador. With the approach of Biennial, this is very much on my mind.

In hopes of serving as your ambassador, let me try to define three "Buzzwords" you might hear at Biennial:

Audacious Hospitality - Audacious Hospitality is one of URJ's four core priorities of the Union for Reform Judaism's 2020 Vision. The URJ actively works to engage uninspired and unaffiliated Jews, partnering with congregations and other Reform Movement institutions to eliminate the barriers that prevent people from finding their place in Jewish life. As stated in the URJ's Audacious Hospitality Toolkit, Pilot Edition, "We recognize that Jewish diversity in all its hues is no longer a wave, but the ocean of Jewish life. As we acknowledge the contemporary demographic shifts of the Jewish people and embrace our full diversity, we seek to create opportunities for learning that strengthen our relationships with one another and build meaningful Jewish communities. We actively embrace interfaith families, Jews of Color, LGBTQ Jews, and Jews with disabilities and help them nurture their Jewish identities. We welcome all."

Plenary - "A plenary is a meeting to be attended by all participants at a conference or assembly, who otherwise meet in smaller groups." At Biennial, plenaries take place most evenings after dinner except for Shabbat. Visit the schedule to find a voting meeting on a topic of interest to you.

Jewish Rock Radio - In addition to knowing what it is, be prepared to hear it all conference long. Jewish Rock Radio (JRR) is a high-caliber, 24-7, Jewish rock internet radio station. JRR broadcasts contemporary Jewish rock music, as well as interviews featuring youth from communities around the country speaking about their exciting experiences from engaging in Jewish life. JRR was founded in 2009 by Jewish musical pioneer, Rick Recht.

At Biennial there will be a series of learning sessions dedicated to the skills, techniques, and rationale of becoming an ambassador for our community. I'm excited to learn with other attendees, curious Jeremiahans, and experienced teachers. I'm excited to bring the learning back to Happ Road, and to talk about the many forms of ambassadorship and engagement. I'm excited to connect our meaningful synagogue community with the larger Reform Jewish community. I'm just all around excited.

But what I'm most excited about is my work with all of you, to serve as your ambassador to Judaism and Jeremiah, and to help you feel comfortable becoming an ambassador yourselves. I'm always looking to learn and grow in this role, so in the spirit of asking questions and taking twice as long to listen to the answer:

How can I better serve you today?

I'm excited to hear your answer.

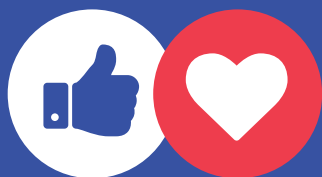

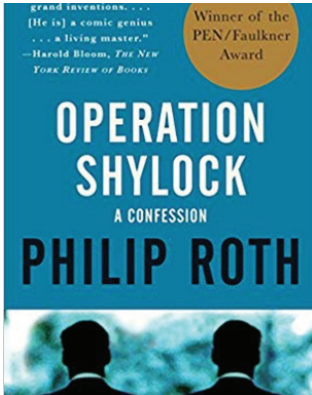

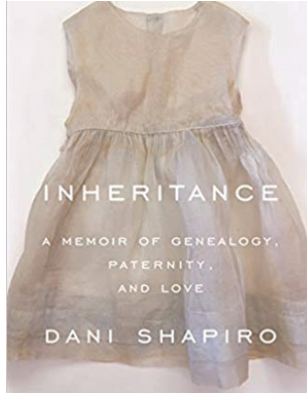
