Befored Friends,

The months of July and August at Temple are filled with planning. We plan for the beginning of the new J-Quest school year. We plan for the High Holy Days. We plan and we reflect, and we take account of ourselves, body and soul. What are the new goals for the year? How can we be better as a team and how can we be better as a community?

Part of our planning, responding to these and many other questions we ask, is determining a theme for the High Holy Days and for the program year. For this year, we have chosen to delve deeply into the prayer/poem *Unetaneh Tokef Kedushat Ha-Yom* from our *Machzor*, our High Holy Day prayer book. This passage is a part of the *Amidah* and represents an emotionally potent moment in our worship. "Let us now relate the power of this day's holiness, for it is awesome..." This poem/prayer points us to the focus of both the lead up to and the observance of Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur: Accounting of Ourselves: Body and Soul. The words guide us not just through this time in our festival calendar, but also that we can and should be able to: See the Holiness/Awesomeness of each day.

The poem 'Unetaneh Tokef' reminds us that we can change our own character, even if we cannot completely control our future. It reminds us that there are three concrete ways we can grow, change, and flourish.

Teshuvah—repentance, response, return—is the ability to move, to change course, to come back to center, to reconcile.

Tzedakah—righteousness—is the ability to pursue justice and to act from a fountain of generosity.

Tefilah—prayer—is the ability to let the world take your breath away, to hold onto and articulate gratitude, hope, and awe.

I want to share with you a beautiful passage from the Talmud that emphasizes this third element of our response in this season, prayer. Does God pray and if so, what is the content of that prayer:

Rabbi Yoḥanan said in the name of Rabbi Yossi: From where is it derived that the Holy Blessed One, prays? As it is stated: "I will bring them to My holy mountain and make them joyful in the house of My prayer" (Isaiah 56:7). The verse does not say the house of *their* prayer, but rather, "the house of *My* prayer;" from here we see that the Holy Blessed One prays.

The Gemara asks: What does God pray? Rav Zutra bar Tovia said that God says: "May it be My will that My mercy will overcome My anger, and may My mercy prevail over My other attributes, and may I conduct myself toward My children, with the attribute of mercy, and may I enter before them beyond the letter of the law."

Similarly, it was taught that Rabbi Yishmael ben Elisha, the High Priest, said: "Once, on Yom Kippur, I entered the innermost sanctum, the Holy of Holies, to offer incense, and in a vision, I saw Akatriel Ya, Adonai of Hosts, one of the names of God, seated upon a high and exalted throne. And God said to me: 'Yishmael, My son, bless Me.' I said to God: 'May it be Your will that Your mercy overcome Your anger, and may Your mercy prevail over Your other attributes, and may You act toward Your children with the attribute of mercy, and may You enter before them beyond the letter of the law.'" The Holy Blessed One's head nodded and accepted the blessing.

This event teaches us that you should not take the blessing of an ordinary person lightly. (Babylonian Talmud, Brakhot 7a)

In these summer months, I encourage you to pause and reflect; to take account of yourself: body and soul. Allow your *Tefilah*, your prayer, to inspire you to let the world take your breath away, to hold onto and to articulate gratitude, hope, and awe. Bless others and allow others to bless you.

A Jewish Community of Meaningful Connection

I am writing this article having just returned from the National Association for Temple Administration Executive Committee retreat. We spent several days in Louisville, Kentucky, discussing the future of our organization and how we position ourselves to help further Reform Judaism. I always love spending time connecting with my colleagues. They are some of the few people who really understand what I am dealing with trying to manage a successful synagogue. I also love being able to visit various cities and synagogues across the country. It gives such a great perspective on what we are doing well and how we can work to improve the member experience.

Our hosts, The Temple – Congregation Adath Israel Brith Sholom, were so incredibly gracious. We were toured around like celebrities, meeting both staff and congregants who couldn't have been nicer. What was evident was this congregation enjoyed being together. But the most impressive item throughout our time was a banner that greeted every person as they entered the building. The banner displayed not the congregation's mission and vision, but the staff's mission and creed to serve its congregation. You see, this community had seen about a 15-year decline in membership and participation. The current Executive Director, a past president of the congregation, saw an opportunity to do something different. He asked the question, "How might we take the idea of community and weave it into everything we do?" The answer to him: every time they are together is an opportunity to build a connection. One example he shared was that meetings start 30 minutes earlier with a reception and intentional bonding experiences.

And who are the drivers in this opportunity? The staff. The mission and creed of the staff team make it evident that their members are the top priority.

Temple Team Mission:

Our mission as Temple Team is to cultivate sacred relationships with members through living the Jewish values of inclusivity, education, community and belonging. "For my house is a house for all people." Isaiah 56:7

Temple Team Creed:

We will promote honesty, trust, and equity with our members through respect and loving kindness. Through our responsive and transparent communication, we will consistently raise the bar for our Temple Team.

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I feel as though their team mission mirrors *our* vision statement of "being a Jewish community of meaningful connection." Like their temple, Jeremiah strives to provide avenues for members to connect at a deeper level. This is done through staff and congregants alike. We might not host receptions prior to meetings and programs, but we intentionally look at each event we hold and ask, "How can we ensure that there are opportunities for individuals to connect with each other?"



I have been very fortunate to have traveled to Israel several times. However, I must say that I have never experienced anything like I did while traveling in Israel with our Temple Jeremiah group, March 23rd - April 2nd, 2023. Where do I even begin to describe this amazing trip? Twenty five of us bonded during a memorable 10-day tour. We began in Jerusalem with dinner on the roof-top at Notre Dame — beautiful and delicious.

There's nothing like an Israeli breakfast and then off to Masada and the Dead Sea. During our time in Jerusalem, we walked the streets of Yemin Moshe (famous for its artists and the well -known Windmill). The market of Machane Yehuda was fun as always; tree planting in the Jerusalem Bird Observatory was terrific.

Of course, the Old City was on our agenda. Being a Monday visit, we sang and clapped with every Bar/Bat Mitzvah 'parade' that went by. I loved our time at the Kotel, the Western Wall tunnels, the Cardo, and the city of David. We had a fabulous dinner at the well-known Eucalyptus Restaurant, interacting with the chef.

Strolling in Safed, a powerful chat with Anat Hoffman of Women of the Wall, an archeology experience at Emek Tzurim, a hike through the Banias Nature Preserve, a jeep ride through the Golan, and then on to the Druze Village of Bukhata. There, we met Nasseba, a strong, resilient Druze woman who shared her journey from poverty to productivity, owning her own successful restaurant.

Allow me to share some of our unique moments of the trip:

Buza Ice Cream owned by an Israel-Arab team, Adam Ziv and Alaa Sweitat. The latter explained the power of this partnership and the hope for peace in the Middle East.

Pinot Igul: An organization that brings awareness and recognition to talented artists with disabilities while fostering art by the disabled as a bridge with the wider community to see them not as disabled but as people with disabilities. We met with the founder, Eldad Shoshtari, who suffers from cerebral palsy. An Israeli soldier, suffering from PTSD, and a lovely woman recovering from a stroke shared their art. We were all so moved. Eldad was thrilled to welcome Jeremiah, the first synagogue to visit his venue and support his mission. One of his artists was commissioned to create an art piece for Temple Jeremiah to highlight the contributors of our last Temple campaign. It can be found in our lobby.

The Grottos at Rosh HaNikra were amazing. The winds were wild and the Mediterranean rushed over us; it was a shock to get drenched, but we laughed and laughed as we pulled out our suitcases and changed into dry clothing behind the bus!

Bike ride along the Promanade, from North Tel Aviv to Jaffa. I never knew that there was a dog beach, adjacent to a Gay beach, adjacent to a "religious" beach. There is something for everyone.

While some of us **shopped** at the Nachalat Binyamin Craft Fair, others participated in the Chef Experience in the Carmel Market, buying ingredients and then making their own salads, pita, hummus, and sauces.

The experiences were far beyond the expectations of all participants; we all expressed the desire to return to Israel in the near future. Keep your eyes open for eventual information about the next Family Trip to Israel. You are going to simply say, "Sign us up!" ◆

Afghan Refugees Welcome Family to Chicago An Update on the Sadat Family

In early 2022, Temple Jeremiah joined with the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS) to sponsor a family from Afghanistan.

The Sadat family, Mohammad, Freba, and boys eight, six, and three, were initially placed at the Fort McCoy, WI U.S. Army Installation until they were "matched" with Temple Jeremiah in January 2022 and moved to an apartment in Rogers Park. A team of 15 Temple Jeremiah volunteers set up their apartment and mentored them as they adapted to their new home.

It has been well over a year and the family is thriving! Mohammad works for S&C Electric in Rogers Park and Freba, who was a math and language teacher in Afghanistan, works as a teacher's aide at New Field Elementary School where two of her boys attend. The now four-year-old boy is enrolled in a full-day preschool next door to the elementary school.

In October 2022, Freba's cousin Fatima, her husband, and six-month-old daughter from Afghanistan, who were also evacuated August 2021, moved from Boston to Chicago to live closer to the Sadats. This extended family provides incredible emotional and social support in addition to valuable childcare help. Fatima is a stay-at-home mother and her husband Zakrullah is employed at Jewel in Rogers Park.

Then, in February 2023, Mohammad Sadat's cousin was also evacuated from Afghanistan, transferred from Atlanta to Chicago, and now resides in an apartment in the same building. 

Chai Society: Who Knew He Was Jewish? Music of W.A. Mozart's Craziest Collaborator


