L'Shanah Vovah!

It's official, the High Holy Day season is upon us, and each of us has begun the annual process of doing a *cheshbon ha-nefesh*, an accounting of our souls. But, as usual this season, spiritual reflection comes concurrently with school, work, family, socialization, transitions between seasons, and so much more — leaving little space for deep, intentional, and honest self-assessment. It might be difficult to find moments of quiet in the midst of our lives. Leaving us, instead, to balance all priorities and, perhaps, to use the hubbub of life to inspire and guide our *cheshbon ha-nefesh*. In all the complexities of our modern lives, the High Holy Day liturgy reminds us that repentance, prayer, and charity are not only cherished values in the Jewish tradition, but also timeless principles that resonate throughout our lives.

Repentance, or *teshuvah*, reminds us that amidst our hectic lives, it is crucial to assess our actions and attitudes. In the midst of constant distractions, taking a moment to see the bigger picture and reflect on the impact of our behavior allows us to grow and evolve as individuals. Engaging in *teshuvah* doesn't necessarily require grand gestures; it can be as simple as acknowledging our mistakes and missteps, apologizing, and committing to making amends. True *teshuvah* turns busy lives into ones of increased selfawareness and the building of stronger, more meaningful relationships.

Prayer, or *tefilah*, is a sanctuary we can retreat to amid the chaos of modern life. Even within our busy schedules, finding moments to engage in *tefilah* provides hope, strength, and inspiration. Whether it's a few minutes of silent meditation, a heartfelt prayer before starting the day, or a moment of gratitude before sleep, connecting to our spiritual selves nourishes our souls so that we might find balance in the face of life's demands. Integrating moments of *tefilah* into our busy lives can serve as a reminder of our higher purpose and a source of comfort during times of stress or uncertainty.

Charity, or *tzedakah*, need not be an overwhelming task. Acts of *tzedakah* are likely already woven into your daily lives, becoming spontaneous and meaningful expressions of kindness. Whether it's lending a listening ear to a friend in need, offering a helping hand to a neighbor, or supporting a cause through online donations. Similar to filling the *tzedakah* box, small acts of *tzedakah* accumulate to create a significant impact. Embracing every macro and micro opportunity to do *tzedakah* enables us to strengthen our sense of empathy and community, fostering a culture of care even amidst our fast-paced lives.

On Rosh HaShanah, in the recitation of the *U'netaneh Tokef* prayer, we are reminded that through the interconnectedness of *teshuvah*, *tefilah*, *and tzedakah*, we find a roadmap for navigating busy, modern life with grace and purpose. These actions are not intended as additional burdens, but as a firm foundation that supports us on the paths to what truly matters.

Within and beyond our Jeremiah community, we can (and do!) encourage and support one another in embracing teshuvah, tefilah, and tzedakah in different and meaningful ways throughout our daily lives. In our fast-paced world, we can find strength and solace in our shared commitment to self-improvement, spiritual connection, and acts of kindness.

In this season of *cheshbon ha-nefesh* (accounting of our souls), let us work to ensure that *teshuvah*, *tefilah*, *and tzedakah* are the unending gifts we offer to ourselves and each other. As we prepare for these High Holy Days, may we discover a deeper sense of purpose, greater compassion, and a harmonious balance between our worldly pursuits and our spiritual growth. *L'Shanah Tovah* to all!

# **Governor Pritzker Visits**

We were so thankful to welcome Illinois Governor J.B. Pritzker to Temple Jeremiah on Thursday, July 27th to speak with our congregation about gun violence prevention.

Before welcoming the Governor to the Bima, Rabbi Cohen presented a gift to Mayor Rottering of Highland Park – a *Mezuzah* – on behalf of Temple Jeremiah and our community.

Rabbi Cohen got a bit emotional as he said, "We wanted to do something a little special for Mayor Rottering, who has shown tremendous leadership during the events of July 4th and her terms as Mayor of Highland Park." As he explained, the *Mezuzah* represents the home, and the scroll that's within it contains the *Shema* and the *V'ahavta*, which were a part of the week's Torah portion, *Va-et'chanan*. "*Va-et'chanan* talks about how God is one, and if God is one, then everything is one. Mayor, you have recognized that we are strongest when we work to manifest the idea that we are indeed one. Thank you for all that you're doing," Rabbi Cohen said.

State Senator Laura Fine, a member of Temple Jeremiah, then introduced the program, which led into Rabbi Cohen successfully moderating a discussion with the Governor about state and national efforts to implement laws to curb gun violence, including Illinois' assault weapons ban.

Rabbi Cohen also facilitated questions submitted from the nearly 500 audience members. Perhaps one of the most difficult questions asked was by a 10-year old member of the audience: "Why are there shops where you can buy guns? Aren't the materials unsafe?"



You can hear the Governor's answer to that question, as well as watch the entire discussion, on our YouTube Channel.

Following the event, Governor Pritzker posted photos on his social media accounts, stating "Tonight, I had a frank discussion with Rabbi Cohen of Temple Jeremiah and the community on what we can do about gun violence. Letting this uniquely American problem continue is a choice. Inaction is a choice. Here in Illinois, our choice is to lead this fight and save lives."

The Governor's appearance at Temple Jeremiah added to our long-standing and award-winning Social Justice Program, which is centered on platforms of Hunger, Criminal Justice Reform, Immigration, Inclusion, Gun Safety, Mental Health, and Anti-Racism. Previous speakers have included Evanston Mayor Daniel Biss and Former Alderman Robin Rue Simmons on reparations, as well as Former Senator Al Franken on voter suppression and filibuster reform.

"It's critical to hold open conversations on issues that really matter. We hope everyone appreciated the opportunity to hear from the Governor and get answers to questions about safety," said Social Justice Committee Co-Chair Barb Miller.

Additional leaders in our community that were present include: State Representatives Jennifer Gong-Gershowitz and Bob Morgan; Lake County State's Attorney Eric Reinhardt; Lake County Board Chair Sandy Hart; dignitaries of Lake County Aaron Cartwright Weinstein and Mark Jones; representatives from Jan Schakowsky's office and from Brad Schneider's office; Sharon Shimski of A Safe Place; Lake County Board Members Gina Roberts and Mara Haltenberg; Lake County Commissioner Sarah Nitsick; Carter Harms from the Governor's office; and Cook County Board Commissioner Scott Britton.

### A Blossoming Garden Project

Many saw the sprouting of a new partnership between the TJ Social Justice Committee and Brotherhood: We built a vegetable garden!

Our partnership worked with volunteers and supporters of a large, well-funded, domestic violence and human trafficking treatment center with 180 beds located in northern Lake County. Barb's and my son, Sam, is a civil engineer and drafted computer-aided design (CAD) plans for a 700 square foot garden with five raised beds surrounded by a wood fence. Then, the contracting team of congregants Dan Weisman and Rob Blomquist, supported by a cast of Brotherhood volunteers, worked side by side with the shelter's supporters and friends, constructing the garden over three weekends in May. Brotherhood contributed funds and manpower, and Scott Byron & Co. landscaping contractor donated additional funds, dirt, and wood chips. The shelter's Board and the Illinois Farm Bureau raised the balance of the necessary funds, which totaled around \$5,500.

This project revealed the best of Temple Jeremiah. Our volunteers worked side by side with their volunteers, in the best spirit of Tikkun Olam, and in our own small way, we made the world a better place. Resident mothers and their children planted vegetables immediately, even before the fence was finished, and kale, tomatoes, zucchini, and other vegetables were seen shooting up from the new beds.
