Celebrating Inclusion at Temple Jeremiah

Every February we celebrate Jewish Disabilities Awareness, Advocacy, and Inclusion Month (JDAIM), which is a month of deep significance in our Jeremiah and broader Jewish communities.

JDAIM is a time when we come together to recognize and lift up the voices, experiences, and legacies of individuals with disabilities. It is a symbol of our commitment to our shared values of *Tzedek* (justice), *rachamim* (compassion), and *kehillah* (community). In a world that sometimes marginalizes those with disabilities, it is our duty as Jews to advocate for a more equitable and accessible society, beginning with ourselves.

At Temple Jeremiah, we have long understood the importance of creating an inclusive and welcoming space for all. Our Torah teaches us that each person is created in *B'tzelem Eloheim* (in God's image), and we fundamentally cherish the worth and dignity of every human being. This extends to those with disabilities, who may face unique challenges, but also may bring unique gifts and perspectives to our community.

JDAIM is a time when we spotlight the experiences of individuals with disabilities and their families. It is an opportunity to listen, to understand, and to amplify their voices. By celebrating JDAIM and our year-round inclusion work, we build bridges of empathy and compassion, breaking down the barriers that separate us from one another. In our Torah, it is written, *Tzedek, Tzedek, Tirdof* (Justice, justice you shall pursue) (Deuteronomy 16:20). To pursue justice is to work toward a world where all people, regardless of their abilities, can fully participate and thrive.

But it is not enough to celebrate past successes during JDAIM. We must not only be aware of the challenges faced by those with disabilities but also take action to address them. We can advocate for more accessible public spaces, for better educational opportunities, and for workplace accommodations. Our Jewish tradition calls us to stand up for the rights and dignity of our fellow human beings. We are all responsible for creating a more just and inclusive world.

I encourage you to reach out to your fellow Jeremiahans, friends, and family members who may have disabilities. Listen to their stories, ask about their experiences, and show your support. It is through these conversations that we can build a more compassionate and understanding community, one that truly reflects the values of our faith.

I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to celebrate every aspect of inclusion with all of you. Together, we can continue to make Temple Jeremiah a place of welcome and belonging for everyone, a sanctuary where each and every person can experience Torah, worship, study, and acts of loving kindness. Let us pursue justice, advocate for change, and strive for greater inclusion. It is in these efforts that we live out the timeless values of Judaism and create a more inclusive and compassionate world.

A Message From...

Communication is literally the transmission of the information. We live in a digital age where people are innudated with communication, often making it challenging to sift through and determine what is credible and what is misinformation. It is so important to educate ourselves and be backed by the facts, especially when our words hold so much power.

I'm proud that Temple Jeremiah has offered our congregants avenues to stay informed and to show their solidarity with Israel. Specifically, I would like to highlight a recent, multisession adult education course taught by Uri Feinberg.

Uri, a Jewish Educator and Israel tour guide, offered a deep dive into the history of the State of Israel through his class: The History of the State of Israel, Zionism through 2023: The first 75 years, how did we get here, and what will happen next?

In the aftermath of the devastation which began on October 7th, 2023, many found themselves on very shaky ground. How did this happen, why did this happen, what actually happened, and how can I explain how I feel and why? These were just some of the questions emphatically circling our consciousness. By taking attendees on a journey through the history of the young state, Uri's goal was to offer a first step toward creating a broader, stronger foundation of knowledge on which to stand. A goal which he accomplished according to those who attended.

Born in the U.S., Uri immigrated to Israel when he was 10, grew up in Jerusalem, served in the IDF, and then traveled the world. A licensed tour guide since 1999, Uri has guided Jewish heritage trips throughout Europe and has lectured on Israel and Jewish identity across North America.





Israel is an incredible place. Full of culture, people, and *shukim* (markets). There are no department stores. Instead, there are small specialty shops, such as the shop selling only lightbulbs near where I lived in Tel Aviv. Motorcycles and electric scooters are commonplace. So common, in fact, that people even ride them in flip flops!

I lived in Tel Aviv for two months as a student in the Aardvark Israel gap year program. During those two months, I had the time of my life. Tel Aviv is a wonderful city to walk through. There is always something to look at. Whether it is a cool clothing store, a cute cafe, or a delicious bakery, there's something on every corner. I lived on Levinsky Market. An amazing place, crammed with restaurants, candy stores, and clothing shops. It makes it easy to find my favorite snacks and drinks. I love Tel Aviv. I love it for its charm, its people, and the happiness it brought me. That is, until I woke up one morning [on October 7th] to a call from my *madrich* (counselor) telling me that there might be sirens.

Ten minutes later, I was in the stairwell with everyone else in my building. Twice more that day we ran to the stairwell to take shelter from rockets. Everything shut down. Only one grocery store was still open, a Super Yuda down the street. We couldn't do anything for days. Classes and internships were canceled, events and trips were postponed. My *madrich* was called to reserve duty. Fear took over the streets. My social media feeds were overrun with tragedy. It seemed endless, like I couldn't

Slowly, programming resumed and shops opened up, but there were still daily sirens. As it continued, more and more of my friends left the country. The program went from over one hundred people to less than twenty in two weeks. The sound of the sirens has become so ingrained in me that I began to flinch at the noise of an electric scooter. It is a terrible period. I can't stop thinking about my safety, the safety of my friends, and the people that are in more dangerous areas. Posters of the hostages are everywhere. We are truly at war. Not only are we facing a war at home, but also a war online.

Antisemitism has become rampant, and I cannot find a place away from it. People don't seem to acknowledge the suffering of Israel. In every other country, it has become less safe to be a Jew. But in Israel, that hasn't happened to such a degree. Jewish and Israeli pride are everywhere. Jewish stars are spray painted on the streets. Israeli flags pop up where there weren't before. We became stronger together. I feel proud of my roots, and proud of the people around me. In Israel, it is a *kehillah* (community). In Israel, I belong.

Evan is 19 years old and has been a member of Temple Jeremiah since 2013. Evan's parents are Ellie and Geoffrey Mogilner.




Community's support and provisions of food, they enabled me to regain strength and eventually resume my life...much like the baby bird. Here's to the Caring Community!"
