Enhancing Our Vision While Remaining Vigilant: An Update on Security at Temple Jeremiah

We live in challenging and uncertain times. Of the roughly eight billion people on the planet, only 16 million, or .2%, consider themselves Jewish. Yet, it seems like there is a lot of anger and hate pointed in our direction. In April 2024, the Anti-Defamation League reported that the number of antisemitic incidents in 2023 surpassed the total of all the previous three years combined. There have even been several incidents in our own community — at schools, stores, and universities — that make us ask "how safe are we?" I am not one who usually questions security protocols, though I do acknowledge that now, more than ever, there is the need for a heightened sense of awareness.

At Temple Jeremiah, we are constantly looking at how we can enhance our vision of being a Jewish community of meaningful connection while remaining vigilant. We continue to maintain a strong partnership with law enforcement and have a police presence in our building. I want to emphasize that last part. We work with police officers only, unlike other institutions that have hired security. It has helped us have a better understanding of best practices and allows us to have the best possible response in emergencies. Our more regular attendees also have found that our officers have built a strong relationship with our congregation and are looking to make sure our congregants and guests are well taken care of.

Additionally, we look at how our infrastructure is set up and what can be done to make it safer. Temple staff regularly meets with security professionals to walk the property and identify any enhancements that may be needed. Utilizing those recommendations, staff and lay leadership develop capital plans and apply for grants to help further harden our facility.

Training is a HUGE part of our security protocols. In addition to ongoing training on first aid, CPR, and drills, staff take part in webinars provided by organizations like Secure Community Network and ADL (Anti-Defamation League). We have also made available to our congregation situational awareness training. Most recently, I took part in an eight-week FBI Citizens Academy, which highlighted the various divisions within the Bureau and how we can best utilize their expertise to protect our community. More than anything, the FBI offers amazing educational resources that can help us avoid all the "bad actors" we knowingly (and unknowingly) encounter daily.

Security is an important aspect of Jewish life. Thanks to the ongoing financial support of our congregants, we have been able to have the police presence, facility enhancements, and ongoing training that we do. Security, however, is expensive, and like everything else in our lives, is becoming even more expensive. For the fiscal year of 2024-2025, we are raising our security fee from \$150 per household to \$250 per household. This increase will help us cover the rising costs of ensuring our facility is safe and secure.

I want to thank everyone for continuing to support our efforts that keep us focused on our vision of being a Jewish community of meaningful connection. One of the crucial ways we accomplish this is by remaining a safe place for people to engage with our congregation. 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Brotherhood Update

Brotherhood Reaches New Heights on Maot Chitim Passover Delivery Day

Brotherhood has been busy in a variety of ways to strengthening connections within the Temple Jeremiah community, including the group's continued effort with Moat Chitim. Brotherhood has partnered with Maot Chitim for the past several years by assisting in the packing and delivering of meals on Rosh HaShanah and Passover.

Maot Chitim, formed in 1908, is a local organization based in Northbrook that provides Rosh HaShanah and Passover meals to over 16,000 people struggling with food insecurity. Recipients include Holocaust Survivors, senior citizens, and families who otherwise would not be able to celebrate the holidays in a manner that many of us do not think twice about. All the meals are delivered in one day, Delivery Day.

Our group of volunteers has grown over the last few years, and, they recently hit their highest count of boxes delivered in one day! On Sunday, April 14th, Brotherhood, along with a large group of TJ volunteers, helped deliver 96 boxes of Passover food!

A typical Maot Chitim Delivery Day starts when volunteers arrive at the warehouse at 6:00 a.m. to pack the perishable food in a human assembly line and load over 5,000 boxes into trucks and cars. Brotherhood members are there to pack boxes, load trucks, and drive trucks to various Chicagoland destinations. One truck makes a stop at Temple Jeremiah where more congregation members, of all ages, help unload boxes and then reload them into personal vehicles to deliver to homes in the area. Rabbi Cohen typically provides coffee, bagels, and cream cheese for the volunteers that gather prior to the truck arriving, further strengthening Temple Jeremiah connections prior to delivering the holiday meals. The most rewarding part of the morning is seeing the joy and gratitude of the meal recipients.

Brotherhood looks forward to delivering meals in the fall for Rosh HaShanah. Delivery Day is September 29th, and it would be wonderful to deliver even more meals. Please consider joining in. Information will be shared as it gets closer to Rosh HaShanah.

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Open Communities Event: Evanston



Supported by a generous donation by Carol and David Golder, a team from Temple Jeremiah recently took part in Walk/Roll the Redline sponsored by Open Communities, Evanston. This was a community walk to raise awareness, funds, and activation for housing justice on the North Shore.

As you likely know, redlining was the practice of marking a map with a red pen to signify the area where lenders should not provide mortgages and realtors should steer Black people to live and white people to avoid. This practice created areas that lacked economic prosperity, good schools, necessary retail such as grocery stores, or investments of any kind. As the team walked, they had an opportunity to see the neighborhood and learn more about its history at stops along the way while also being educated about fair housing practices.

TJ's Executive & Development Assistant, Jill Nutkis, was quoted in JUF's May issue of Jewish Chicago (both digital and print). The article, titled "Every Mezuzah Has A Story to Tell," discussed several Chicago-area mezuzot and the stories behind them. Jill shared the story of her grandfather's mezuzot, which came from Israel. See below for Jill's full quote!

Skokie mom Jill Nutkis' grandfather Aryeh Cohen was born and grew up in present-day Israel. Before the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, he fought with the underground group, the Haganah. After Israel's founding, he fought in the Armed Forces during the War of Independence. Afterwards, he moved to the U.S., and brought his Israeli mezuzot with him. "I'm the third generation to use them," Nutkis notes. "It's the history behind them that's significant for me and my family."


