When I was in middle school I took my first biology class. In the first days of that class we discussed the scientific process, the relationships between curiosity, observation, and conclusion, and the definitions of what make something "alive." I can practically remember the day that our teacher gave us seven processes to look for that would help us to determine if something was alive or not, and what might fall under the umbrella of biological sciences. They were movement, respiration, sensitivity, growth, reproduction, excretion and nutrition.

Not being a professional scientist, I don't know if these processes are still accepted as the basic behaviors of life. But every time I think about the ways that we notice, encourage, or understand "life" I come back to this 6th grade knowledge. Most importantly I come back to the idea that respiration, breathing, taking in the necessary and letting go of the detrimental, is one of the most basic needs for our lives.

We are on the precipice of a time of profound spiritual reflection and renewal, the High Holy Days. Central to the holidays of Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur is the concept of life itself and what it takes to perpetuate life. As an intentional pair, Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur echo and are inspired by this process of breathing in and out.

Rosh HaShanah, the Jewish New Year, is a time of spiritual intake. Like inhaling fresh air, we are guided through the liturgy and teachings of our faith. The shofar is blown, calling us to spiritual awareness. The blast, like the breath, penetrates deep within us, all the way to our soul, stirring us from our exhaustion. The holy days offer a moment to inhale the essence of faith, community, and purpose.


Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, is a time of spiritual release. Like exhaling, it is our moment to let go of the year's burdens for 5784, our missteps, and our regrets. Through prayer, fasting, and the accounting of our souls, we are able to release our emotional and spiritual toxins, creating space for renewal.

The unending rhythm and cycle of breath, the inhale and exhale, mirrors the cyclical nature of life itself. The High Holy Days, too, are an essential part of this cycle, marking the end of one year and the beginning of another. Just as breath sustains our physical lives, these holy days sustain our spiritual lives. In them, we find a new rhythm for spiritual renewal, a moment to pause, reflect, and prepare for the year ahead.

The last line of the Book of Psalms declares: *Kol haNeshamah t'hallel yah*, let everything that has breath praise God. (Psalm 150:6). Prayer and praise are often described as the breath of the soul. On the High Holy Days, prayer takes on a profound significance. The rituals and rites that we perform are filled with prayers of confession, repentance, hope, and praise. Each breath we take during prayer is a moment of connection with all that surrounds us and is a chance to pour out our heart and soul.

As we enter this holy season, we can start simple, with one of the most basic processes of life. When we access prayer and praise through focusing on respiration, we gain a deeper appreciation for the significance of our lives and our actions. The act of breathing, simple yet profound, becomes the key to taking another step in each of the spiritual journeys, journeys of intake and release, of life, and renewal.

# Perspective A Message From Our Rabbi Emeritus RABBI ROBERT D. SCHREIBMAN Rabbi Emeritus

Dear fellow Congregants,

It was a year ago from this moment, on this very spot, I wrote a New Year's message, and it is time for me to do it again. Since then, a lot has occurred - many wonderful things like marriages, births, and B'nai Mitzvah, to name a few, but also many sad things - like illness, accidents, and deaths. # Profiles in Giving: Sara and Alan Turover

About two years ago, Temple Jeremiah participated in a collaborative campaign with five other local Reform congregations to raise money to provide Magen David Adom (MDA) and the people of Israel with a new Life Support ambulance in honor of Israel's 75th anniversary. Longtime Jeremiah members, Sara and Alan Turover, were lead donors in that campaign and were personally recognized along with all the participating congregations, including Temple Jeremiah, with their names appearing on the doors of the ambulance. That ambulance is currently operating from MDA's Jerusalem Station, actively responding to medical emergencies on a daily basis.

I reached out to Sara and Alan to talk about their support of MDA and their thoughts about the impact of their gift particularly after the horrific events of October 7th. Our conversation was illuminating and inspiring—and included a touch of humor as we noted the shared connections that emerge through playing Jewish geography.

Sara and Alan have been longtime supporters of MDA. They were drawn to this organization that is filled with volunteer first responders from all walks of Israeli life—Jews, Druze, Christian, and Muslim—and which treats all types of medical emergencies for all of Israel's citizens. From routine day-to-day incidents such as helping women in labor, heart attack victims, and car accident injuries, to injuries from terror attacks, as Sara notes, "MDA is there in the moment of need and is necessary for the health and welfare for all its citizens." And, MDA is there beyond Israel, providing hands-on support for catastrophic events world-wide, which the Turovers hope helps the global community see that Israel "is not just about Jews, but about helping humanity...and elevates what Israel is about."

The tone of the collaborative campaign was celebratory and uplifting - a way to bring people together to mark Israel's significant milestone and support an incredible organization doing critical work. Sara and Alan were thrilled that Temple Jeremiah was part of this community effort.

Then it was October 7th and the need for MDA services increased exponentially. This motivated Sara and Alan to immediately duplicate their prior gift. The full fleet of ambulances, medicycles, helicopters, and all other vehicles was mobilized. American Friends of Magen David Adom airlifted 27 ambulances to Israel to meet these unprecedented urgent needs.

Since October 7th, MDA has been operating 24 hours a day, responding to incidents and emergency calls across the entire country, often providing lifesaving treatment surrounded by rocket attack and gunfire. MDA's blood services is supplying all of the blood needed by the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) and is distributing blood to all of Israel's hospitals to treat civilians. It is also increasing its supply of tested and processed breast milk for babies whose mothers have been killed, injured, kidnapped, or called to IDF reserve duty.

I wondered if the Turovers ever contemplated how profound the need for Life Support ambulances would be. Alan's response was sobering: "We have been around for a while and have seen changes in the world. In the back of our minds, we know that Jews are always fighting for survival, if not immediate, it will happen. History tells us we will have these needs again."

Sara and Alan's giving philosophy is guided by two prongs: first, by choosing to take action that has an immediate, tangible impact today, and second, by taking action to support the future Jewish community. Supporting MDA through the ambulance campaign, seeing the actual ambulance that was headed to Israel to join the fleet, and, since October 7th as Israel fights for its survival, providing additional generous donations to medical service organizations like MDA and Hadassah imparts the direct and immediate impact they seek through the first prong of their philosophy.

They accomplish the second prong through another passion, providing scholarships from the *Sara and Alan Turover Jewish Overnight Camping Scholarship Fund*, which they established at the Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago, for children to attend overnight camp, deepening Jewish identities that these youth will carry into their adulthood.

Sara and Alan concluded our conversation with wise words that reflect the power of community and philanthropy—a shared living value at Jeremiah: "If we all do a little bit, together we will overcome the insurmountable."




## The Escape Artist: The Man Who Broke Out of Auschwitz to Warn the World

In April 1944, Rudolf Vrba became one of the very first Jews to escape from Auschwitz and make his way to freedom. He did it to reveal the truth of the death camp to the world. Against all odds, Vrba and his fellow escapee, Fred Wetzler,

smuggled out the first full account of Auschwitz the world had ever seen—a forensically detailed report that eventually reached Franklin Roosevelt, Winston Churchill, and the Pope.

In 1972, when workers in Pottstown, PA were digging the foundations for a new development, the last thing they expected to find was a skeleton at the bottom of a well. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the longheld secrets kept by the residents of

Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows. When the truth is finally revealed about what happened on Chicken Hill and the part the town's white establishment played in it, McBride shows us that even in dark times, it is love and community—heaven and earth—that sustain us.


