



Experiential Judaism

As the Director of Congregational Learning, and the parent of a two-year-old, I'm always looking for creative ways to get children involved in Judaism on a level that they feel comfortable with. That's one reason why I was thrilled to be selected for the 2024 K'ilu Lab Cohort for Jewish Family Educators in February!

As part of the program, I participated in a two-day intensive to explore ways to bring Jewish family programming to life through theater, play, and creativity. It was an incredible experience, and it motivated me to bring K'ilu programs to our Jeremiah families, to make sure that Jewish stories and traditions remain accessible and dynamic for all young learners.

It was exciting to host our first program in April — a multigenerational shabbat dinner and tot shabbat for our tots and their grandparents. Led by Founder and Co-Creator of The K'ilu Company Jonathan Chapman and Temple Jeremiah Member Jordan Zelvin, the program skillfully showcased storytelling, theater, puppetry, and play to make Jewish stories come alive.

Then, in September, we welcomed back tots, parents, and grandparents for a Back-In-Time High Holy Day Adventure. Families were invited to climb aboard a ship and follow Jonah on an adventure under the sea and inside the belly of a whale. This interactive, theatrical adventure brought the High Holy Days to life through immersive storytelling, music, movement, and play.

Both of these programs provided ways for families to continue the learning and exploration at home. In fact, we were inspired to implement this type of experiential Judaism into our First Grade Consecration ceremony on Sunday, October 20th, a milestone for children marking the beginning of their Jewish journey. Parents were able to meet with Chapman before joining their children for an activity from Chapman's book, a gift they were then able to take home. Though it may seem like a small moment in time, experiences like this can have a big impact on children. And, of course, parents and grandparents sharing these experiences with their tots make for precious memories.

If you haven't yet had a chance to attend a K'ilu program at Temple Jeremiah, I encourage you to register for our **Back-In-Time Chanukah Adventure on Friday, December 13th at 5:30 p.m.** Attendees will travel back in time to save the Temple and bring light back to the city by becoming a Maccabee. We hope our young families will help us bring the Chanukah story to life during this event. Dinner will follow.
