Shaforn!

If you look above the green couch in my office, you will see a wall-hanging with a tree, a dove, and some Hebrew embroidered around the border. That wall-hanging was a gift from my parents in honor of my cantorial ordination, a tapestry created by the fiber artist Shirley Waxman, who also made the tallit I received upon becoming Bat Mitzvah and still occasionally wear today. My parents had managed to keep the details of the present a surprise, but they did ask me to pick a particularly meaningful verse of Torah. I studied the Song of Songs for my thesis, and so that was at the front of my mind. I chose Song of Songs 2:12 – "The blossoms have appeared in the land, the time of pruning has come; the song of the turtledove is heard in our land."

I always love a double meaning in Hebrew, and the word for "pruning" in Song of Songs 2:12 is one of the best examples. It is "zamir," which also means "singing." I love the interconnectedness of the imagery between the land and its blossoming and the act of creating music. This verse heralds a flourishing, the renewal associated with the arrival of spring.

But I think there's an even deeper connection between pruning and singing. There is nothing to prune if we don't plant the seeds, water them, tend the plants, and encourage them to grow. So, too, singing and the musical culture of a community, do not come out of nowhere. They must be practiced and tended to.

In my first few months at Temple Jeremiah, I have immersed myself in learning about the musical ground of this community - what music people know and like, and what they value out of their music and worship programs. I'm getting to know people who like to participate in music and worship. I am building the musical staff and building relationships with them, too. I am so grateful that David Lornson came out of retirement to support me and the choir with his kindness, compassion, and detailed musicality. I am also so grateful that Marianne Kim has been willing to take on a bigger role, as she is a truly unique musician, able to play anything from classical organ to jazz piano. She is kind and collaborative, and I couldn't imagine a better musical partner. And, we are so excited to have our new choir director, Marissa Simmons, on board! Marissa is a fabulous musician and her enthusiasm for Jewish music is infectious.



In addition to our wonderful professional team, I am blessed with an incredible roster of volunteer musicians. I am so enjoying leading services with Fred Kagan with his experienced and beautiful guitar playing. Archie R. is our amazing music *madrich*, who is willing to try anything, brings so much to our J-Quest music, and is such a great role model for the younger kids. Our adult choir is incredibly dedicated and rises to any occasion with beautiful music. And the *ruach* of our Shir Joy youth choir brings a smile to all our faces. I love making music with so many diverse musicians and being able to see our congregants shine!

We are all working together to tend the garden of rich musical programming here at Jeremiah. Even if you are not someone who finds yourself on the bimah, if you are in the congregation at a worship service or in the audience at a musical program, you are a co-creator of that experience. Music and prayer do not take place in a vacuum, but feed on and grow from the energy in the room.

In addition to tending the existing garden, I am starting to sow seeds to root my cantorate here at Temple Jeremiah through music and education. We will grow together, and blossom together.

One way to celebrate our coming together is my installation weekend, February 21st-23rd. On Friday, February 21st, we will have a special service of installation where many of the different Temple Jeremiah musicians will get to collaborate with some of the people who have influenced my musical and cantorial journey. Cantor Richard Cohn will be my installing clergy; he was the director of the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music when I was in cantorial school. Some of my friends and classmates will be there as well. I am so excited and grateful to have this opportunity to bring together my friends and family with my new Jeremiah family. On Saturday, February 22nd, we will have trivia night and dinner here at Jeremiah as well, and on Sunday, February 23rd, we are working on an opportunity to have J-Quest students participate in a collaborative fiber arts project. It will be an incredible weekend!

Together, we will make our garden grow – Temple Jeremiah will be an enduring and fertile soil for a rich and blossoming Jewish musical life. We will sing together, pray together, and be together in moments of sadness and moments of joy. The time of singing has come.

# Dear Temple Jeremiah Community,

When Rabbi Heaps joined our community as an Assistant Rabbi in 2017, we knew that there was something special about her. We had high hopes for a bright future together and we couldn't have been more insightful. Rabbi Heaps has proven to be a strong leader who, among other things, is warm, engaging, inclusive, wise, spiritual, optimistic, and compassionate.

In December 2022, Rabbi Cohen shared with our community that the Executive Committee and Board of Directors had approved his recommendation to renew Rabbi Heaps' contract. We have been blessed with Rabbi Cohen's wonderful leadership for over a quarter of a century, and we have great confidence in a bright future for many decades to come with Rabbi Heaps as our Senior Rabbi.

**JEWISH DISABILITY** AWARENESS, ACCEPTANCE, AND INCLUSION MONTH

# What is JDAAIM?

Every February we celebrate Jewish Disability Awareness, Advocacy, and Inclusion Month (JDAAIM), which is a month of deep significance in our Jeremiah and broader Jewish communities. JDAAIM is a time when we come together to recognize and lift up the voices, experiences, and legacies of individuals with disabilities.



# Can you explain more about the significance of JDAAIM in Jewish communities?

JDAAIM is a symbol of our commitment to our shared values of Tzedek (justice), rachamim (compassion), and kehillah (community). In a world that sometimes marginalizes those with disabilities, it is our duty as Jews to advocate for a more equitable and accessible society, beginning with ourselves.





Our Jewish tradition calls us to stand up for the rights and dignity of our fellow human beings. We are all responsible for creating a more just and inclusive world.

# Why is it important that we celebrate JDAAIM?

JDAAIM is a time when we spotlight the experiences of individuals with disabilities and their families. It is an opportunity to listen, to understand, and to amplify their voices. By celebrating JDAAIM, we build bridges of empathy and compassion, breaking down the barriers that separate us from one another. In our Torah, it is written, Tzedek, Tzedek, Tirdof (Justice, justice you shall pursue) (Deuteronomy 16:20). To pursue justice is to work toward a world where all people, regardless of their abilities, can fully participate and thrive.

# How about specifically at Temple Jeremiah?

At Temple Jeremiah, we have long understood the importance of creating an inclusive and welcoming space for all. Our Torah teaches us that each person is created in B'tzelem Eloheim (in God's image), and we fundamentally cherish the worth and dignity of every human being. This extends to those with disabilities, who may face unique challenges, but also may bring unique gifts and perspectives to our community.



How can I get involved?

All are welcome to join us on Friday, February 14th at 6:30 p.m. for our annual Scott B. Crane Abilities Awareness Shabbat. We will have a special guest speaker and will have a chance to further discuss the importance of JDAAIM. Congregants are also welcome to learn more about our Inclusion Committee on the next page, whose members actively plan programming and educate our congregants on issues involving those with special needs.

# Committee Spotlight: Inclusion

The Temple Jeremiah Inclusion Committee had its beginnings in 2005 with the intention of including any and all differently-abled temple members in full religious life. The initial goal was to eliminate barriers that members might face. However, the goal became to also provide specific programs for the enjoyment and benefit of individuals with special needs and their families.



# Through the years...

Fifteen years ago, the physical structure of the temple building inhibited non-ambulatory members from full participation in some programs and events. Since then, the Inclusion Committee has been able to:

- Ensure that pathways throughout the temple are accessible to users of wheelchairs and walkers
- Facilitate the installation of handicap accessible bathroom door entries, as well as accessible water fountains
- Provide accessibility to the stage in the Slotnick Social Hall Stage Area as well as other areas. A couple of years ago, the temple was gifted a portable lift that can go anywhere inside the building as well as outdoors. The lift is large and sturdy enough to support a heavy wheelchair, yet light enough for an average person to operate.
- Offer aids to hearing and visually impaired individuals so that they can participate fully in worship services
- •Make available devices for anyone who has difficulty holding a regular-sized prayer book
- •Create an "Accessibility Cart" to hold the above devices as well as "fidget" items for those with sensory issues and attention difficulties







# ...to today!

Most of the Inclusion Committee's current work is in programming for our participants and educating our congregants on issues involving those with special needs. The hallmark of our programs is that people with different abilities help lead our services in prayers, songs, and by carrying the Torah.

# Every year we host:

- A *Rosh HaShanah* service for those needing a special format of worship
- A Chanukah party
- •A Passover *Seder*, which also involves our guests with special needs
- •Social activities such as picnics and visits to our temple from comfort dogs
- Havdallah services
- Mitzvah projects
- •Special programs every February to highlight Jewish Disability Awareness, Acceptance, and Inclusion Month. Programs include a Shabbat speaker and other activities.

# Treasurer's Report

I wanted to provide a brief report on the results of our completed fiscal year, which ended June 30, 2024, and the results of our recently completed first quarter, which ended September 30, 2024.

# **Year-End Financial Summary**


For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, our actual expenses amounted to approximately \$2,541,000, slightly below the budgeted amount of \$2,556,000, resulting in a savings of \$15,000. Actual revenues totaled approximately \$2,273,000, which is 11% lower than the budgeted revenues of \$2,556,000. This shortfall was primarily due to lower-than-expected membership commitments and school enrollment. While we continue to welcome new households into our community each year, we also have members leave our community, as well as members who require financial assistance. Thanks to the generosity of our congregation, fundraising income exceeded our budget of \$211,000 by 25%. After the allocation of certain expenses to various temple funds, and the interest and dividends earned last year on our building and general endowment, we ended the year with an overall shortfall of approximately \$211,000. In October 2024, the Board of Directors approved the allocation of funds from our general and building endowments to cover this shortfall. Despite this, our endowment investment portfolios continued to grow over the past fiscal year due to strong investment returns.

#### Q1 2024 Results


In the first quarter of the new fiscal year, we generated total revenues of approximately \$1,354,000 and incurred total expenses of approximately \$663,000. As we project for the remainder of the year, we anticipate that total expenses will align with or fall slightly below the approved budget of \$2,605,000. However, projected revenues are expected to be slightly less than the budgeted \$2,605,000. As we continue into our 2024-2025 fiscal year, *tzedakah* and philanthropy will continue to play an important role in our operating budget. Your ongoing financial support helps the temple thrive as we continue to nurture a vibrant and connected community. Every donation, regardless of size, makes a difference for our programs, worship, social justice efforts – strengthening our community and our impact.



**February** The Little Liar

Eleven-year-old Nico Krispis has never told a lie. When the Nazis invade his home in Salonika, Greece, the trustworthy boy is discovered by a German officer, who offers him a chance to save his family. All Nico has to do is persuade his fellow Jewish residents to board trains heading "north," where new jobs and safety await. Unaware that this is all a cruel ruse, the innocent boy reassures passengers on the station platform every day. But when the final train is loaded, Nico sees his family being



herded into a boxcar. Only then does he discover that he has helped send them—and everyone he knows and loves—to their doom at Auschwitz. Nico escapes—but he never tells the truth again. In The Little Liar, Mitch Albom examines the human repercussions of deception by interweaving the stories of four characters and revealing the consequences of each person's honesty and dishonesty.


